

2	320	53	Floyd Davis	1905-1977	1941 Co-winner with Mauri Rose; drove in four Indy 500s					
3	380	53	Herbert Jones	1904-1926	Driver in 1925 race; died trying to qualify for 1926 race.					
4	1405	95	Charles Wyatt	1880-1960	Hired to promote first events at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway in 1909.					
5	780	95	Lawson Harris	1900-1939	Riding Mechanic; rode with Lewis Meyer when he won in 1933. Died while riding with Babe Stapp during testing at the Speedway.					
6	959	96	Donald H. Herr	1889-1953	Relief driver for the 1912 Indy 500 winner Joe Dawson. He was not credited as the co-winner.					
7	473	96	Harold J. Shaw	1906-1941	Midwestern Dirt Track Champion 1941.					
8	754	28	Herb Porter	1914-1999	Nicknamed "Herbie Horsepower," mechanic for Bobby Unser, Johnny Rutherford, and A.J. Foyt.					
9	44	29	Daniel Marmon Franklin Marmon Howard Marmon Walter Marmon	1844-1909 1899-1924 1876-1943 1872-1940	Indianapolis auto manufacturing family. A Marmon Wasp won the first Indianapolis 500.					
10	107	27	Jack Rodgers	1935-2002	Car owner for Tony Bettenhausen's racing team.					
11	244	100	Charles Wiggins	1897-1979	African American mechanic, three time winner of Gold & Glory Sweepstakes, premier event of the Colored Speedway Association. Often sought by 500 drivers and Mechanics for advice.					
12	294	104	Denny D. Duesenberg	1914-2005	Son of Frederick Duesenberg. First car that he and his dad built together in 1930 won the Indy 500 three times.					
12	294	104	Frederick Duesenberg	1876-1932	Duesenberg Motor Company. Forty Duesenberg-powered cars finished in the top ten from 1913-1934, including three firsts. Duesenberg J and SJ Models are among the premier cars of all time.					
13	293	104	Frank Fox	1877-1931	Driver in the first Indianapolis 500. Also involved in Harness Racing, including The Fox Stakes.					
14	538	103	Bernard "Buddy" McAtee	1954-2007	IMS President, Chief Operating Officer & Executive Producer of IMS Productions. Beautiful Indy 500-themed monument with a bronze car.					
15	39	23	Arthur Newby	1865-1933	Speedway co-founder and founder of Indianapolis Chain (now Diamond Chain) and National Motor Vehicle Company. Business partner of Charles E. Test.					
16	34	23	Charles E. Test	1858-1910	Founder and President of National Motor Vehicle Co. (a manufacturer of buggies and electric and gas automobiles); business partner of Arthur C. Newby; former partner in Diamond Chain manufacturing company.					
17	2	23	James A. Allison	1872-1928	Speedway co-founder and co-founder of Allison Engineering, later two divisions of General Motors.					
18	24	46	Frank Wheeler	1863-1924	Speedway Co-Founder and founder of Wheeler-Schebler Company, a carburetor maker.					
19	124	42	Louis Schneider	1901-1942	1931 Winner driving Bowes Seal Fast Special; had six total 500 starts.					
20	110	58	Tony Bettenhausen	1951-2000	Member of famous racing family; eleven Indianapolis 500 starts. Died in plane crash.					
21	164	47	Evanson B. Earp	1899-1984	Riding mechanic, then doctor.					
22	334	47	Harry C. Stutz	1876-1935	Nine Stutz cars finished in top ten in early 500s. His Stutz Bearcat was a very popular early car.					
23	552	48	Theodore "Pop" Myers	1874-1954	Speedway General Manager starting in 1916. Died while still working for the Speedway.					
24	150	60	Erwin "Cannon Ball" Baker	1882-1960	Drove in two early 500s, held many motorcycle and car speed & endurance records					
25	713	60	"Eddie" Waldo Edenburn	1885-1934	Chief Steward from 1919 until 1934. Also supervised power boat races.					
26	223	62	Charles Merz	1888-1952	Drove in first three 500s; won 2 <sup>nd</sup> place in 1913; later race official and car sponsor					
27	12	67	Robert M. Bowes	1884-1945	Long-time car sponsor					
28	91	67	Arthur B. Lathrop	1918-1970	Car owner					
29	312	78	George M. Ober	1911-1989	Co-founder of USAC					
30	83	78	Paul Russo	1914-1976	Had five top ten finishes from 1941-1959. Tony Bettenhausen Sr. died while testing Russo's car in 1961					
31	91	78	Harry "Cotton" Henning	1896-1948	Chief Mechanic on driver Wilbur Shaw's racing team

36	Niche 143- <b>F</b> (South)		A.J. Watson	1924-2014	Four-time Indianapolis 500-winning chief mechanic and as a prolific car builder he was a six-time winning constructor with his famous "Watson roadsters."					
37	(South) E-14- <b>F</b>		Dr. Thomas Hanna	1909-1981	Longtime Speedway Medical Director. Its medical building named in his honor.					
38	(South) D-21- <b>B</b>		Frederick Merz	1876-1932	Car sponsor and maker of Merz Cycle Cars					
39	(South) D-2-NN		August Duesenberg	1879-1955	Duesenberg Motor Company. Brother of Fredrick Duesenberg who specialized in racing engines					
40	(South) B	-12- <b>AA</b>	Gaylord "Snappy" Ford	1889-1953	Riding Mechanic & Track Official					
41	(South) D	-20- <b>BB</b>	Jimmy Daywalt	1924-1966	Rookie of the Year 1953; had top ten racing finishes in 1953 & 1955					
42	(North) D-10- <b>2K</b>			1895-1970	Official. Raced airplanes in 1930s, then founded Roscoe Turner Aeronautical Corporation in Indianapolis					
43	(North) D-14- <b>2K</b>		Herrington	1891-1970	Designed the Jeep and other light trucks for military use, then trolleys & buses					
44	(North) F-16- <b>2A</b>		Howard S. "Howdy" Wilcox	1920-2002	Son of 500-Mile Race winner; founder of Indiana University's Little 500 bicycle race and instrumental in founding the Indianapolis 500 Festival					
45	(North) C-17-2A		Karl Kizer	1898-1974	Mechanic; Official and Speedway Hall of Fame Museum curator					
46	(North) C-19-2A		George Bignotti	1917-2013	Famed Mechanic with 85 Indy Car race wins as a crew chief					
47	(North) D-8-2DD		Jim Hurtubise	1932-1989	Rookie of the Year 1960; drove in ten 500s					
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48	53	223	Gerald "Jerry" Hoyt	1929-1955	Winner of 1955 pole position. Died racing in Oklahoma City.					
49	106	224	Ronnie Duman	1929-1968	Drove Indy 500 1964-65-66-67-68. Died in Milwaukee race.					
50	1529	224	Pat Vidan	1914-1983	Chief Starter, 1962-1979					
51	1528	224	David W. Reeves	1923-1983	Racing Photographer					
52	886	224	Frankie Del Roy	1912-1978	Riding mechanic in the 1930s and later a USAC official					
53	723	235	George Amick	1924-1959	Driver; won 2 <sup>nd</sup> place in 1958. Died racing at Daytona					
54	386	37	John Donald Aitken	1885-1918	Won more races at Indianapolis than any other driver in history. He recorded a total of 15 victories at the Speedway in minor dashes and feature events from 1909 to 1916 but never in the Indy 500, except as a team manager.					
55	1062	70	Wilbur Brink	1919-1931	Killed while playing in his yard on Georgetown Road when struck by a flying wheel from crashed racecar.					
56	1472	70	Elfrieda Mais LaPlante	1892-1934	Racing and stunt car driver. Airplane wing walker.					
57	240	56	Howard S. "Howdy" Wilcox	1889-1923	Winner in 1919; had five top ten finishes; first driver to break 100 mph; died racing in Altoona, Pennsylvania.					
58	3 61		Louis Schwitzer	1880-1967	Automotive engineer who won the 1st event at the track, a 2-mile race in 1909. The Louis Schwitzer Award for Automotive Engineering is an annual part of the Indy 500 festivities.					
59	26	61	Thomas Binford	1924-1999	Chief Steward for 20 years starting in 1974.					
60	6	14	David Parry	1852-1915	Buggy manufacturer, turned automaker with Parry Auto & Overland Auto Companies.					
61	331	222	Brian Hasler	1958-2020	Co-Founder of IRMA (Indiana Racing Mem. Assoc.) who helped install the Racing Legends Historic Sign, Final Finish Line, and develop this self-guided tour.
